14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25	CDP chair opening remarks: Dr. Ottley welcomed the Council and thanked the Council for the significant work accomplished regarding the wellbeing strategy. Achievements include the growth of the Wellness Ambassador Program and the expansion of the Well-Being Index. The goal is to decrease the barriers to providers seeking mental healthcare. He acknowledged the many stressors dentists and their team's experience and noted that the dentalcare workforce is not immune to burnout. Challenges with lack of interoperability on both the administrative and clinical data side impact workflow and patient care in an environment already stressed with workforce shortages. The Council continues to move forward with their work on interoperability specifically with DICOM and ePDMP as priority topics. He expressed gratitude to the Council for sharing their personal goals to collectively unify the council in its strategy development to address the challenges of the workforce shortage. He requested a high level of engagement to assist the Council in establishing a meaningful pathway and actionable next steps to address workforce shortages.
26 27 28 29	Trustee Liaison remarks : Dr. Leighty expressed his gratitude for all the hard work completed through the Council on Dental Practice including efforts through Standards and thanked the Council for their leadership on Wellness efforts. He provided an update on the activities of the Board of Trustees including the ADA Large Group and Multi-site Practice Engagement Task Force.
30 31 32	2024 Practice Institute Operating Plan: The Council accepted, through the Consent Calendar, an informational report detailing the status of the 2024 Practice Institute Operating Plan highlighting new and continuing programs.
33	EMERGING ISSUES
34 35 36 37	Workforce Strategy Session: Dr. Ottley opened the session by restating the goal to develop a strategy to address the dental team workforce shortage. The Council continues to research various roles, funding opportunities and levels of education of the allied team. Dr. Alberti reported that a dentist-facing version of the Emerging Workforce Models toolkit has been developed and posted to the ADA website.
38 39 40 41 42 43	Despite variations in state level educational requirements, licensure, and responsibilities of Allied Dental Team, the Council was unified in prioritizing the availability of adequate workforce to increase utilization of dental services and achieve operational efficiencies. Some members of the Council suggested various actions including school-based recruitment; staff retention strategies; and sustainable educational pathways for recruitment, education, and career advancement; as well as the completion of a comprehensive policy review to reflect a consistent ADA philosophy.

17	PRACTICE AND POLICY TOPICS
18	Standard Developing Organization and Compliance in Practice: The Council accepted, through the
19	Consent Calendar, an informational report on the status of the provider and patient safety activities of the
20	American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE), National Fire
21	Protection Association (NFPA), Organization for Safety, Asepsis and Prevention (OSAP) and Centers for
22	Disease Control (CDC).
23	Use of "Allied" instead of "Auxiliary" in ADA Policy: Dr. David Fried, the Practice & Policy
24	Subcommittee chair noted the subcommittee's discussion related to the term "auxiliary" team member
25	used in several ADA policies. He noted that the Speaker had been consulted and had opined that the
26	Council could request an editorial change to the use of this term throughout the policy book. After
27	discussion, the Council supported use of the term "allied" throughout all Current ADA Policies for
28	consistency. On vote, the Council approved the following resolution:

38	Policy Proposal from Large Group/ Multi-site Practice Engagement Taskforce: Dr. Leighty reported
39	on activities of the ADA Large Group and Multi-site Practice Engagement Task Force. He emphasized the
40	desire of the Taskforce to convey broader support for inclusion of dentists in all practice models. The
41	Council discussed and suggested amendments to the proposed policy. Dr. Leighty thanked the Council
42	for their consideration and reported the Task Force will return the amended policy to CDP to finalize and
43	vote after input from other Councils.
44	DENTAL TEAM HEALTH WELLNESS & WELL-BEING
45	Wellness Ambassador Program: Current ambassadors are increasing awareness with state and local
46	societies, and with State Boards of Dentistry regarding health and wellness and intrusive language in
40 47	licensure. The third group of ambassadors will be onboarded in September and help expand and

- 1 transition the Wellness Ambassador Program to at least three states utilizing ADA resources and best 2 practices. 3 Well-Being Index (WBI): The Council was shown a WBI video that is available to help communicate the 4 availability of this free, confidential, screening tool. The Dental Team Wellness Advisory Committee 5 (DWAC) will review aggregate data quarterly to understand the trend in data and to recommend solutions 6 to increase awareness of the data and reduce the percentage of distressed providers and students by 7 promoting resources. 8 Resolution 517H-2023 Preventing Unfair Discrimination Update: The pilot program includes the state 9 dental associations from Florida, New Jersey, and Wisconsin. State leaders met with a licensure reform 10 expert from the American Medical Association to learn how to read applications for stigmatizing language. 11 A toolkit highlighting lessons learned from states that achieved licensure reform will be posted to 12 ADA.org/Wellness. 13 ADA STANDARDS PROGRAM 14 Ms. Stanford highlighted the increasing recognition of the ADA Standards program with the American 15 National Standards Institute (ANSI). The Food and Drug Administration recognizes and uses 16 conformance with these standards as criteria to demonstrate safety and efficacy for clearance to market 17 products in dentistry. 18 Interoperability and Data Exchange: The Digital Dentistry Technology and Innovation (DDTI) 19 Subcommittee is chaired by Dr. Thompson, who updated the Council on collaborative efforts of the 20 subcommittee and the newly reorganized ADA Standards team. Two new ADA Standards, No. 1114 21 Implementation Requirements for the Effective Use of DICOM in Dentistry and No. 1116 Dentistry 22 Interoperability with Regulatory Compliance in EHR Systems, have been approved and will respond to 23 Resolution 308 Promoting Use of DICOM In Dentistry and Resolution 313 Incorporating Prescription Drug 24 Monitoring Program (PDMP) into Practice. Dr. Thompson shared appreciation for all the efforts of 25 standards volunteers. 26 Dr. Thompson reported that the ADA's March 13 webinar, titled "Federal Regulatory Panel on Dental 27 Interoperability and Data Exchange", was well attended with representation from industry, federal 28 agencies, providers, and payors. Post webinar survey results expressed great interest in the topic and 29 requested additional topics for consideration to continue the prioritization of interoperability. A response 30 webinar titled "Dental Interoperability and Data Exchange," scheduled June 12, will include panelists from 31 industry, academia, and practice to continue the discussions from the previous webinar. 32 **RELEVANT ADA INITATIVES** 33 ADA Executive Director Presentation: Dr. Cohlmia presented Catching Up: How the ADA is moving 34 quickly to address the challenges of today. He highlighted ADA's challenges and initiatives including 35 generational transitions and emerging group practice models. ADA's values that drive the future are 36 customer and member focus; sustainability, innovation, nimbleness, and global presence. International 37 growth will be achieved through standards, licensing, research, partnerships, and innovation. ADA's 38 conversion to Fonteva and Salesforce will take place on July 8. In 2025 the new membership model will

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Division of Government and Public Affairs: Mr. Linn provided an update to the Council regarding CGA activities and federal government affairs initiatives. he addressed various topics including access to care and dental benefit programs; Medicaid and CHIP; Medicare, private insurance, dental team shortages,

- 20 the 2025 meeting of the ADA House of Delegates.
- 21 **Recognizing Retiring Council Members**: Dr. Ottley expressed his gratitude for the knowledge, interest,
- 22 and time shared by Dr. Julia Townsend during her service on the Council. He recognized the council
- 23 members concluding service in 2024 including Dr. Barnes, Dr. Dornfeld, Dr. Fitzpatrick, Dr. Rekhi, Dr.
- Leighty, and Ms. Wilkinson. Dr. Ricci highlighted Dr. Ottley's work as chair.
